For our April gathering we met at the church for lunch provided by Jan Nichols and Margaret Turner.

We discussed the book Eleanor: A Spiritual Biography by Harold Ivan Smith. This is a book about Eleanor Roosevelt, and, in the author's words: the faith of the 20th Century's most influential woman.

This book was written in 2017 and is not a biography but it is a recounting of the life of Eleanor Roosevelt and all the aspects of her life which were shaped by her Episcopalian Christian faith in God. As a result of her childhood and youth she formed strong Christian ideals which shaped her entire life.

Many people are shaped by their beliefs as Eleanor was, but very few experience the public life she had and the opportunities that life provided for her. She used her public platform in a myriad of ways to enhance the lives of scores of individuals and groups and governments.

This is an inspiring book containing many, many stories of Eleanor's sharing of her Christian faith. There are many references to specific Bible verses she lived by and how she used those teachings of her faith to teach and share her ideas with others.

There are many books available in the church library; this is just one of them. I hope you will check out the selection of books in the narthex and inside the church office and decide to check one out for your reading pleasure.

This is an update from Rufus and Angie Rosser's daughter Ashley, who grew up in this church and dedicated her life to full time Christian service. She was honored on UMW Sunday March 17

ASHLEY ROSSER WILSON

“Life begins at the end of your comfort zone.” I heard these words in a sermon in 2010 as I was discerning my next steps post-graduation from college. I had been feeling a call to mission work, but did not know if I was ready to leave the comfort of my family, friends, and church community.

This congregation has always been a place of comfort for me. You nurtured me in my faith formation beginning as an elementary school student through Sunday school, music ministry, and dance ministry (remember Hula?). As I grew older, you walked with me as I went from learning who God is and how God calls us to live, to putting those things into practice with youth group and mission opportunities. As a young adult, you encouraged me to go from solely participating in ministries to leading ministries, including the youth bell choir and youth Sunday school.

While I found comfort in being a member of this church family, you also equipped me for what lay beyond my comfort zone. My spiritual foundation formed in this church prepared me to serve as a missionary in Campus Ministry in Fargo, North Dakota, to wrestle with God's call for me and the church while in seminary, and to lead in the United Methodist Church here in New Jersey where I am the Executive Assistant to the Director of Connectional Ministries for the Greater New Jersey (GNJ) Annual Conference

In my current role:

- I support the Director of Connectional Ministries and the Connectional Ministries Team (the administrative staff I supervise and the Directors who create resources in the 5 markers of vitality for GNJ churches),
- I support the Connectional Table (GNJ agency/board/committee chairs),
- I serve as the point of contact for my team for the other teams within the conference office.
- I also administer the GNJ grant programs and serve as the project manager for several projects including Annual Conference Sessions and the annual GNJ Tanzania Pastor's School.

The Tanzanian pastors' school provides an opportunity for Tanzanian pastors (who are talented, passionate about their faith, and spirit-filled leaders who may not have more than a high school diploma) to receive practical, theological training in the Wesleyan tradition. As project manager, I had the opportunity to travel to Tanzania in 2018.

Some of you may be wondering why I'm in New Jersey. I met my husband who is from New Jersey when he, too, was placed in Fargo, ND as a missionary. Towards the end of his service, he began to feel called to ordained ministry in the United Methodist Church and enrolled in Candler Seminary in Atlanta. I also attended Candler Seminary and graduated with an MDiv. When Wil graduated from seminary, he received his first appointment in the Greater New Jersey Annual Conference. After two years of serving as an Associate Pastor, Wil received his first solo appointment.

We have been so blessed by the many congregations we've been a part of and are looking forward to seeing all of you, the congregation that shaped who I am today, soon.
